f the name Paul Hergott sounds familiar, it might be because he's helped you with a legal issue, captured your attention with his legal column in this newspaper or fed you a hot diggity dog at the Westside Daze parade.

Besides keeping high profile on this side of the lake, Hergott has made a name for himself in the Okanagan as a personal injury lawyer that ICBC isn't too fond of.

But the winner of three Westbank Chamber Key Business Excellence Awards views the insurance corporation's dislike for him as a good thing.

"I act only against ICBC," said Hergott. "I never act on its behalf." If you've ever read

The other thing he likes doing for free is cooking up hot dogs and giving them out to locals at the annual Westside Daze parade in July.

Besides raising their

children, he and his wife of 10 years work together as well.

"I feel physically ill when I hear of people being taken advantage of. Working for people against ICBC allows me to be instrumental in preventing that from happening."

Busy these days implementing a paperless office, he's doing his best to work on behalf of the environment too.

"This is a system quite unique to the law industry and we believe it will make a real difference. Every little bit helps."

One of the founding members of the Okanagan Business to Business networking group, he
